


#### Theme #10 – Housework

#### **Boot Brushes**

'On a Saturday night, my father used to lie a sheet of newspaper down on the floor to prepare to polish his boots. It was his weekly ritual ready for church on a Sunday. ## **Activity: Using the senses**

- > Think about how you can relate housework to all your different senses.
- $\triangleright$  Gather some materials like *Brasso*, window cleaner, scented soap and furniture polish.
- ➤ Have a smell of the products what do they remind you of?
- > Feel the weight of a flat iron, feel the roughness of a wash board or listen to the texture of a scrubbing brush.
- > Think of these objects as a way to trigger memories.
